Each of us has a powerful journey story deep in our personal heritage. It may be a story of a family uprooting itself in order to stay together, or of sons and daughters moving to another land, or of a distant ancestor, perhaps unknown ....

Americans have always been intensely mobile, and we still are. Farmers, mechanics, entrepreneurs, immigrants, and slaves have built American society over four centuries. Travel over roads, rails, rivers, and trails — even the skies — has shaped the American cultural and economic landscape.

The Kirkman House has been selected by the Smithsonian Institution and Humanities Washington to host *Journey Stories*, the Smithsonian's latest Museums on Main Street exhibit. Exploring the roles of migration and transportation in the development of the United States, The exhibit will be at the Kirkman House from January 29 through April 24. This year has been especially busy with maintenance, restoration and improvement projects at the museum.

We spent the spring and summer months preparing the kitchen for a major restoration project. Layers of paint were removed from the woodwork, and loose plaster was

removed. The kitchen should be completed and open to the public in early 2011. We are tremendously grateful to Ace Hardware for donating the plaster for the walls, and to Roy and Lianne Schellenberg for volunteering their time and talent.

Our biggest challenge this year was rehabilitating the front porch. The portico began showing signs of movement recently, and a structural assessment confirmed that it needed immediate attention. The structural

portion of this project was recently completed and the columns seem to be much happier and straight. Cosmetic restoration still needs to be completed, but should we wish to do so, we could now hold a dance on the roof.

The wall between the side porch and rear of the house got two coats of paint and now matches the side porch, restored in 2009, nicely. Next year, with help from a Heritage Resource Center grant,

we'll continue around the back of the house, and begin restoring the windows.

The carriage house also received a lot of attention this year. We pulled back one corner of the carriage house back wall that had been pushed out a couple inches at some point and secured it to the foundation. The ground at



the back of the carriage house was re-graded to correct years of earth contact to the structure and siding. We also installed foam insulation in the walls, and began the process of painting the exterior. Our long term goal is to use this building as additional event and programming space, and we intend to install lighting and drywall in 2011.

Outside the carriage house we have started to re-lay bricks to form a patio which will lead to a path the length of the new Victorian Heirloom Rose

Garden. The rose garden will screen the chain link fence and the apartment house behind, creating a beautiful space for outdoor events. Look for completion of that project early next spring. Thanks to the College Place Garden Club for providing needed funds, and to Wenzel Nursery for providing materials.

A big thanks to all the kids from Whitman College and Walla Walla University who came out to help with several of these projects. Without them most of this work would not have gotten done this year.



We have a lot of projects like these on our list and can always use volunteer help along with materials.
